Pete McCann is one of the most prominent jazz guitarists on the New York scene. As a sideman, he's worked with top modern players including trumpeter Kenny Wheeler, saxophonist Kenny Garrett, and drummer Peter Erskine, doing countless gigs and appearing on more than 50 recordings.

McCann is impressively diverse--his style ranges from straight-ahead to rock to traditional Brazilian, on both electric and nylon string guitars. His first two CDs as a leader, Parable (1998) and You Remind Me Of Someone (2000), showcased these and other influences, and his latest album, Most Folks (Omnitone), continues this pan-stylistic approach. Playing alongside saxophonist John O'Gallagher, bassist John Hebert, and drummer Mark Ferber, McCann explores Pat Metheny-influenced territory ("Most Folks"), modal rock ("Yes, My Friend"), and acoustic Latin ("Las Tias"). While many albums like this sound annoyingly hodge-podge, Most Folks's blend of influences feels completely natural.
